# Human rights and constitutional law

- •Rationales for constitutionalizing: public health, autonomy, gender equality (Cook & Dickens)
- •Contextualize naming harms of laws (HRW)
- Protect both individual & collective rights

# Administrative law & regs: availability, accessibility, acceptability & quality

- practice of medicine, nursing, pharmacy, telemedicine/health, self-managed (SMA)
- delivery, prescription and coverage of services
- therapeutic drugs and essential medicines

# **Availability**

- Shifting nature of delivery of services (Assis & Erdman; Skuster et al)
- Mapping gaps in service availability (Canada, 1997, Ireland, 2023)
- WHO: medical abortion=essential drug

#### **Accessibility**

Nondiscriminatory access in law and in fact

# Acceptability

•CESCR GC 14: services must respect medical ethics

Context (Gomes & Mendes) & training (Ortiz-Millan & Kissling)

Ethical Guidelines (FIGO): confidentiality (Carrera et al), conscience (Ramon et al), stereotyping (Cook et al)

Quality- scientific, medical, cultural appropriateness
